SONJA DAHLGREN PRYOR

2012 Lifetime Achievement Award Recipient

Sonja Pryor recently celebrated her 50th anniversary as Music Director of Chorus North Shore in Rockport, Massachusetts. Ms. Pryor's

charismatic personality and passion for musical excellence have developed this community chorus, which itself just completed its eightieth season, into a leading arts organization on Boston's North Shore, performing choral masterworks with orchestra and internationally known soloists and



embarking on regular concert tours abroad.

A large ensemble open to all without audition, Chorus North Shore brings together singers of all ability levels and ages to learn and perform great choral works at a high artistic level. Under Ms. Pryor's leadership, the chorus regularly performs the challenging works of Mozart, Verdi, Mendelssohn, Handel, Stravinsky, Bernstein, and others for large and appreciative North Shore audiences. In 2005, the group created the Chorus North Shore Honors Youth Choir, a fully auditioned choir for youth age ten through high school which performs both on its own and as a featured performer with Chorus North Shore.

Music has been "Sunny" Pryor's lifelong calling. At age 15 she was already conducting the Junior Choir at her local church in Detroit, Michigan while also singing in three different choruses. She later earned a Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in voice from Gordon College in Wenham, Massachusetts and a Master of Sciences degree in Music Education from the University of New Hampshire. 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2012 ALFRED NASH PATTERSON GRANTS

Choral Arts New England held its 28th annual awards ceremony on October 14, 2012 at the Commonwealth Club in Boston, where the following grants were presented. (Concert dates listed are subject to change within the current season.)

- Back Bay Chorale, Boston Mass., for the premiere on March 17, 2013 of *Anything Can Happen*, a new choral work by Mohammed Fairouz, which includes poetry by Seamus Heaney and excerpts from the original Arabic-language gospel of Jesus.
- Bella Voce Women's Chorus of Vermont, Essex Junction, Vt., for a concert on May 18, 2013 celebrating spirituals sung by those following the Underground Railroad through Vermont.
- **Blue Heron Renaissance Choir**, Auburndale, Mass., a four-year grant to support recording the Peterhouse Partbooks, the largest and most important extant source of pre-Reformation English sacred music.
- **Choral Art Society**, Portland, Maine, for *Vidimus Stellam*, a commissioned work for choir and brass performed on December 1 and 2, 2012 in Portland.
- **Counterpoint**, Montpelier, Vt., to support high school ensemble workshops on choral singing in spring 2013 that will be professionally video-recorded.
- Greater Middletown Chorale, Middletown, Conn., for performance on April 28, 2013 of *Letter from Italy*, *1944: War's End*, a large-scale choral-theatrical work by Sarah Meneely-Kyder based on the life of a young physician and his family haunted by war.
- **Greater New Haven Community Chorus**, New Haven, Conn., for a commissioned work to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the chorus.
- Lorelei Ensemble, Cambridge, Mass., to commission two works for eight women's voices from emerging composers employing multimedia and electronic music and featuring elements of dance, video, lighting, and amplified voices. Performances will be May 10 and 12, 2013.
- New Hampshire Master Chorale, Plymouth, NH, to support a commission on themes of Latin America and Spain to be performed on November 16–18, 2012.
- **Treble Chorus of New England**, North Andover, Mass., to support hiring instrumentalists for the chorus's annual holiday concert on December 15, 2012.
- The Vermont Choral Union, Essex Junction, Vt., to support travel and other expenses for a series of performances of primarily a cappella choral music in communities throughout Vermont.

Hillis of the Chicago Symphony Chorus. She has attended the Aspen Music Festival and the Adirondack Festival of Music and has conducted workshops in Massachusetts, Maine, Connecticut, New Hampshire, New York, and Michigan.

Ms. Pryor has been associated with music education for over 30 years. She has taught music to students from kindergarten through college. She served as Director of Music of the Hamilton-Wenham school district in Massachusetts and has taught at the University of New Hampshire, Gordon College, and Northern Essex Community College. She is often a guest lecturer at colleges and universities, and has lectured at the New England Conservatory for the National Association of Teachers of Singing. Ms. Pryor has been a church choir director in Michigan and Massachusetts, including Director of Choral Music at the Park Street Church in Boston. She is an active member of Chorus America and The American Choral Directors Association, and also serves on the Board of the Cuvilly Arts & Education Center in Ipswich, Massachusetts.

For her valuable contributions to music and music education, Ms. Pryor has been recognized by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts as an Outstanding Massachusetts Arts Educator. In 1999, she received the Walker Hancock Award for Lifetime Achievement in the Humanities.

NEW LANGUAGE WEBSITE

Singers and choruses might be interested in a new commercial lyric diction website, called SingersBabel, which is devoted to helping singers be more expressive and communicative in foreign languages. It features web-based learning tools that include language tutorials, sound sets, and videos of over 300 word-for-word translations and IPA transcriptions with texts spoken at normal and at slow pace by native speakers.

There is a free limited-access user subscription and a three-day free trial subscription with full access. Ensemble subscriptions are available as well as institutional subscriptions for colleges and universities.

Every year Choral Arts New England gives special grants to support choral music. Most grants have been in the \$1,000-2,000 range, but requests for larger (or smaller) amounts will be considered. The money can be used to commission new music, hire instrumentalists, rent or purchase scores, pay travel expenses, or carry out a special project, either performing or nonperforming. Grants are not generally given for regular operating expenses.

Applicant organizations must be non-profit and certified tax-exempt by the IRS. Choruses or any organizations that provide support to choral music are eligible, including church choirs and school or college choruses.
